COVID-19 in COMESA Stuational Update N° 14





Cases in The Region


Three countries in COMESA namely Eritrea, Mauritius and Seychelles have not recorded any new COVID-19 cases in more than a week. They have also recorded full recoveries of the initial cases and currently have no active cases. Two of them, Eritrea and Seychelles have not recorded any COVID-19 related deaths.

This notwithstanding, the region has maintained an upward trajectory of cases with a total of 6,429 reported in the last seven days. The trend is partly attributed to enhanced testing by majority of the Member States. The highest number of new cases have been reported in Egypt (3,018), Sudan (1,065), DR Congo (514), Zambia (494) and Somalia (366).

The new cases are a pointer to an increase in the numbers of community transmissions of the virus. In Zambia, Kenya and Uganda, for instance, community transmissions are closely linked to mobility especially of truck drivers crossing borders in the region. Due to this, countries have intensified testing at border points.

Category 1: Over 1000 Confirmed Cases

As per the current data Egypt, Sudan, DR Congo, Djibouti, Somalia and Tunisia have recorded the highest numbers of total cases in the region with 12,764, 2,591, 1,538, 1,518, 1,455 and 1,043 respectively. It is notable that Djibouti and Tunisia have also recorded a high number of recoveries with 493 and 178 active cases respectively. The low number of new cases in Tunisia, for example, has informed the decision by the Government to lift some of the restrictions.


Category 2: Between 100 and 1,000 Confirmed Cases

In this category, Kenya and Zambia have shown a steady increase of new cases with 212 and 494, respectively. The upsurge in Zambia is linked to cross-border transmissions. For Kenya, the increase of cross-border infections led to the closure of its borders with Somalia and Tanzania; except for cargo. Kenya has also rolled out mass testing in areas considered hotspots. Other countries that recorded higher numbers in the last one week, are Ethiopia, Madagascar and Uganda. On the other hand, Eswatini and Rwanda recorded low numbers of new cases.

Total confirmed COVID-19 cases




The number of confirmed cases is lower than the number of total cases. The main reason for this is limited testing.

In this category, Burundi, Comoros, Libya, Malawi and Zimbabwe have continued to record a low number of new cases. However, Burundi and Malawi have shown a notable increase in new cases. With elections due in these two countries in May and June, respectively, and mobilization through campaigns going on, the rate of new infections is likely to increase.




