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





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OMESA region recorded the highest increase on COVID-19 cases in the initial months of March and April 2020. During this period, the numbers rose from around 1,000 cases by end of March to almost 10,000 by end of April representing 526.14%.

Since then, the monthly rate of increase has been declining as indicated in the graph below. The monthly decline can be attributed to the measures that have been put in place by various governments to ensure containment in the spread of the virus.



For the past seven months countries in the region have been battling to control the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. It is evident that the continued spread of COVID-19 in the region has had a serious economic impact leading to business closures, disruption of agricultural production, loss of employment and revenue. As of 22nd September 2020, the COMESA region had recorded 343,881 COVID-19 cases while recoveries and deaths were at 235,940 and 10,597, respectively.



Even though the overall number of cases are still rising, the monthly rate of COVID-19 infections reported is declining and this can also be attributed to low levels of testing. This decline, and the high numbers of COVID-19 recoveries recorded so far in the region may explain the current strategies by Governments to reopen up various sectors including education, business, tourism, ports of entry and other transport services.
