# COVID-19 NUMBERS CONTINUE TO SURGE IN COMESA AS VACCINATION EFFORTS GAIN MOMENTUM






Since the beginning of 2021, COVID-19 cases in the COMESA region have continued to surge in some countries. Figures compiled by COMWARN indicate that the cumulative number of COVID-19 cases have increased in Tunisia (251,169), Egypt (200,739), Ethiopia (202,545), Libya (158,251) and Kenya (131,116). The effects of the continued surge in COVID-19 cases in the region continue to be felt in different spheres. There is, for example, an already significant impact on livelihoods due to limited economic activities in sectors that include transport, tourism, agriculture and education, among others. Local businesses have been forced to shut or scale down in many countries.

The confirmed cumulative COVID-19 cases in Tunisia as compared to the total cases in the region stands at 19.37%. Kenya, on the other hand, started experiencing a third wave surge in the month of March. This third wave upsurge can be attributed to the numerous political activities and others related non-adherence to preventive measures. For instance, in the month of March alone, Kenya recorded a total of 24,991 new cases as compared to 5,117 new cases in February 2021. The biweekly change in COVID-19 cases for Kenya is shown below:

#### Biweekly change in confirmed COVID-19 cases



The biweekly growth rate on any given date measures the percentage change in the number of new confirmed cases over the last 14 days relative to the number in the previous 14 days.



The surge in the new COVID-19 cases in Kenya prompted the Government to review measures in place and tighten them including revising the curfew time, banning political activities and limiting the numbers of people at social gatherings. The Government further instituted lockdowns in five Counties namely Nairobi, Kajiado, Machakos, Nakuru and Kiambu.

#### **Vaccination Efforts**


The vaccination efforts in the region continue to gain momentum as more countries receive their first batches. Some of the vaccines approved by COMESA Member States include Oxford/ AstraZeneca, Moderna, Pfizer/ BionTech, Sinopharm, Johnson and Janssen (J&J), Sinovac, Sputnik V, among others.

According to data compiled by COMWARN, nine COMESA Member States have received and started rolling out COVID-19 vaccines. Analyzed according to the raw numbers of doses administered, the data indicates that Rwanda so far has administered the highest numbers of doses followed by Malawi, Seychelles, Zimbabwe, Kenya, Uganda, Mauritius and Egypt. This can be summarized in the figure below:

Most countries have prioritized health workers, security personnel, government employees and the elderly.

However, if the daily dosages are juxtaposed by population (per hundred people) the data shows that Seychelles, Malawi, Tunisia and Rwanda have administered more doses of vaccines. Seychelles, for example, has so far vaccinated about 70% of its population.
